Kathleen Hansen | Artistic Director

Kathleen Hansen leads with passion, precision, and a deep commitment to community and inclusion. A respected conductor, educator, and vocal coach, Kathleen has directed the chorus since 2014, helping it grow artistically and organizationally. She also serves as Master Director of the San Diego Chorus of Sweet Adelines International, GALA 411 Artistic Advisor, and Sweet Adelines International Faculty. Kathleen holds degrees in music education and conducting from San Diego State University and is currently pursuing her Doctorate of Musical Arts at Boston University. A sought-after clinician and mentor, she is also the creator of *Vocal Warmups with Kathleen*, a vocal warm-up app and YouTube channel. Her work reflects her belief in the transformative power of music-making and group singing. In 2025, she will conduct members from San Diego Women's Chorus at Carnegie Hall.



Calieanne Grossheim Assistant to the Artistic Director

A Florida native, Calieanne Grossheim's lifelong love of singing led her to earn degrees in vocal performance and choral conducting. Since moving to Southern California in 2021, Calieanne has become an active member of San Diego's vibrant choral community. She serves as the Assistant Director of the San Diego Women's Chorus and sings with San Diego's premiere professional choral ensemble, SACRA/PROFANA.

She was recently appointed the Assistant Director of Worship Ministry at The Village Church, where she works with singers of all ages. Recent solo engagements include soprano soloist for *Handel's Messiah* with La Jolla Symphony and Chorus and Village Community Chorale, and soprano soloist for *Bernstein's Chichester Psalms* and *Mendelssohn's Hear My Prayer*, also with Village Community Chorale.

Her husband, Colton, is active duty Navy and they love spending time outdoors with their two rambunctious children, Dilly and Jude.

Tim, a professional musician and educator, originally hails from the Midwest where he received his Bachelors in Music Education and his Masters in Accompanying and Vocal Coaching from the University of Illinois @ Urbana-Champaign. He is also in his 21st year as the Director of Music at Chalice Unitarian Universalist Congregation in Escondido.

Tim has been a part-time faculty/staff member at University of San Diego, San Diego State University and Mira Costa College. He has received three *National Youth Arts* Awards for Outstanding Music Direction.

PROGRAM NOTES

Holly Near wrote *Singing for Our Lives* after hearing the news of the assassination of San Francisco City Supervisor Harvey Milk, a champion of gay rights. She and a friend were driving to the city to be part of the vigil that was taking place, and while driving, Near began humming the notes that would become the song. By the time they arrived in San Francisco, she had written two verses. The song grew and morphed, becoming an LGBTQ+ anthem that still resonates today.

Water Fountain has been described as a sonic collage that weaves together the social, political and personal strands of our time. With a vibrant mix of afrobeat, indie pop, and avante-garde, this tUnE-yArDs' song speaks to environmental decay, economic disparities, and a thirst for change.

On The Mountain is a beautiful and compelling traditional Ukrainian love song that became the focus of an unusual joint fund-raising project, SING FOR UKRAINE!!! between earthsongs Choral Music and arranger Donald Patriquin. In early 2022, the invasion of Ukraine was gaining in intensity and most of the world was reeling in sheer shock. Patriquin was inspired to arrange this song. Instead of payment, he asked that the choral director who requested the piece make a payment to a credible organization that was responding to the situation in Ukraine. It grew to a non-profit collaboration with earthsongs that still supports the effort today.

Billie Eilish's song *What Was I Made For* plays at the end of the Barbie movie, a stark contrast to the rest of its upbeat soundtrack. As it plays, Barbie transforms from doll to woman, experiencing a wide range of human emotions for the first time. Eilish has shared that the character's anxieties about losing her innocence and facing uncertainty echo her own struggles about finding her purpose in life.

Seasons of Love is perhaps the most iconic song from the musical Rent. It reminds us that in a world bound by the rigid schedules of clocks and calendars, we can also measure our lives by abstract concepts like experiences and love — counting the qualitative over the quantifiable.

Holly Near sang *I Am Willing* at a rally outside the White House in May 2006. Cindy Sheehan and numerous groups including Gold Star Families for Peace, AfterDowningStreet, Democracy Rising, Code Pink, and Traprock Peace Center, brought a petition to the gates of the White House. The petition called on the Bush administration to not attack Iran; it was signed by over 40,000 people.

Banned Together by trans composer Pax Ressler urges everyone to stand up for the beliefs and rights that others are trying to suppress — to band together against the banned.

Katerina Gimon's *Fire* comes from a set of choral works titled Elements. The energetic music incorporates body percussion, colorful timbres, and unique vocal calls to embody the sound and feeling of fire.

When Wrabel first wrote his stirring song *The Village*, he didn't intend to share the track with anyone beyond the two trans fans who'd inspired it by telling him their story. At their insistence, he did release the track, and it's since taken on a life of its own. Since its debut in 2017, it has become an anthem for the LGBTQ+ community. Between YouTube and TikTok, a growing number of young queer people are finding the track and resonating with its hopeful message, and the knowledge they are not alone in their journeys.

On Children sets music to poetry from *The Prophet* (1932), a book by Lebanese-American author Kahlil Gibran. The original gospel-hymn version was recorded by Sweet Honey in the Rock in the 1980s. The poem contemplates parenthood and how future generations are shaped.

Not Ready to Make Nice is a country-pop power ballad released by The Chicks in response to the brutal criticism and backlash the band faced after expressing opposition to the war in Iraq. In the song, The Chicks refuse to apologize for their past and shed light on the ways that society weaponizes hate to vilify those that go against the status quo.

In a world filled with chaos and uncertainty, Melanie DeMore's **Standing Stone** is a pillar of strength and a call to support each other. Its words are simple: I will be your standing stone; I will stand by you.

Chappell Roan was inspired to write *Pink Pony Club* after visiting the Abbey, a gay bar in West Hollywood. Having grown up in a small town in Missouri, she stated that "visiting the bar was the first time I could truly be myself and not be judged." It was eye-opening and changed her outlook and direction. She was particularly enthralled by the go-go dancers and brought her experience to life in this campy pop song.
